Small Kindnesses

Each June, my Cape Cod neighbor, Mrs. Clark, returns to the cottage her family built in the 1920s. At 95, she still stays by herself. Neighbors pick up the mail at the post office. Children carry out the trash and mow the lawn. No one goes to the store without calling to see if there is something of need.

Twice a week, Mrs. Clark bakes brownies. She wraps each individually in cellophane and sends them off to her helpers. The kettle is always warming on Mrs. Clark's stove. Visitors might surely have a minute for something to drink. As the summer unfolds, Mrs. Clark's kitchen fills with the smell of homegrown hospitality. Music and laughter drift out from the porch. In July, Mason jars filled with flowers appear on your deck. In late summer, she sends over preserves. In December, you get a Christmas card even if you are a rabbi. The woman knows how to return a kindness.

Annually, Mrs. Clark's girlfriends arrive for a week's stay. The youngest is 78. This year, after a furious session of housecleaning, the ladies posed for pictures riding the brooms they had just put to such energetic use. Three hundred years ago in Puritan New England, such playful behavior could have gotten them burned at the stake.

In honor of Mrs. Clark's divisible-by-5 birthday, there were plans for a friendship quilt, but the project never quite got off the ground. The girls were having much too much fun. There's always next year, they quipped. Yet, at 95, there was the awareness that the years, however joyous, are not innumerable.

Mrs. Clark will tell you that those who endure prevail. But, eventually, the obstacles placed in our path cannot be overcome and we surrender our grasp on this gift called life.

Still, it seems to me that our lives together are best built on the exchange of small kindnesses. A jar of preserves. The gift of a flower. The return of a smile. The favor of a word. These are the gestures, the tokens that make life bearable. There is no tally sheet in the exchange of small kindnesses, but there is memory of the moment and the sure knowledge that life at its best is lived with people, with decency, and in the words of our prayerbook with the consolation that when the few years of our earthly pilgrimage are ended we may be ready to meet our end with tranquil mind.

May you consecrate the days of your life with deeds of kindness, caring and love. May you be surrounded by good friends and cherished family, and may your life ever be a praise to the One who bestows the gift of life upon you.


Jeb Rosen Called to the Torah

The Rosen family would like to thank everyone who joined us for Jeb's Bar Mitzvah Saturday, June 20th. It was wonderful to see a full house and have participation (and help!) from so many friends at Har Shalom! It meant the world to us to have all of you there. These words express what we hope for Jeb as he embarks on his adult adventure:

"May you live to see your world fulfilled, May you be our link to future worlds, and may your hope encompass all the generations to be. May your heart conceive with understanding, may your mouth speak wisdom and your tongue be stirred with sounds of joy. May your gaze be straight and sure, your eyes be lit with Torah's lamp, your face aglow with heaven's radiance, your lips expressing words of knowledge, and your inner self alive with righteousness. And may you always rush in eagerness to hear the words of One more ancient than all time." Talmud (Brachot 17A)

Jeb's Bar Mitzvah day coincided with World Refugee Day. Here is part of his speech with a call to action:

"For my B'nei Mitzvah Project I have decided to help raise awareness of the refugee situation in Africa. The Jewish People know what it is like to be refugees and to face many hardships. We have also faced religious oppression and can help the Africans now. We want to give hope to them, because we know what it is like to be without hope. One of the major problems for refugees is malaria, a disease carried by mosquitoes. By giving bed nets to people in Africa, we can save lives. The URJ has teamed up with Nothing But Nets to deliver these to Africans, especially those hundreds of thousands living in refugee camps. I have launched a web campaign to help buy bed nets and would like you to join me in donating to this cause. Twelve ways you can support the Synagogue for Missoula Capital Campaign
