Laurie's Letter

The Jewish month of "Mar Cheshvan" began on Shabbat Lech Lecha, October 25. Some of us know it by the shorter name Cheshvan. "Mar" means bitter, and some say we call it bitter Cheshvan because it contains no celebrations other than Shabbat.

True, after the fullness of the High Holy Days, plus the festival of Sukkot , and the final flourishes of Simchat Torah, the quiet calendar of Cheshvan looks remarkably austere! For a pulpit rabbi, it is a time to exhale and get back to life as usual, and I would argue that it's the same for all of us. Now we have an unbroken palette of weeks to assimilate and enact the lessons we might have garnered during the Days of Awe. We can settle in and live them.

Some of my friends take on an additional gratitude practice in Mar Cheshvan. I say "additional" because our daily prayers are certainly a gratitude practice; this additional practice is a personal, daily recognition of things for which we are grateful throughout the month.

But what about this word "mar", bitter? I don't find Cheshvan to be bitter at all! It's a relief to have an interlude of quiet time. Instead, I turn the first word backwards to spell "ram", meaning "high" or "elevated". In Ram Cheshvan, we can find the space to experience the elevation of the everyday stuff in our lives. Now, it's up to us, without the continual prompting of special observances, to see the glow of holy sparks in the regular events of our lives. Even the ordinary is extraordinary, thank G!d.

What is my "Money Is No Object" vision for Har Shalom? At the Annual Meeting, we did an activity where we brainstormed just that question. This is an activity that I enjoy engaging in. I thought you might like to see inside my head as to what that vision is for Har Shalom.

I would add a second story on the building and dedicate the upstairs to Hebrew education.

I would tear out the downstairs and have it rebuilt with a commercial kitchen and a big, bright sanctuary with floor to ceiling windows opening onto a beautiful garden. I would give the Rabbi her own well-lit office.

I would remove the garage and in its place, create a space for Bev to expand her Montessori school.

I would put the teachers on salary and give each one his or her own classroom to decorate and have storage for projects.

I would rent out our commercial kitchen space to vegetarian food cart owners.

I would purchase a second Torah and replace all the covers.

I would make certain that the Rabbi's discretionary fund was well-stocked with money to help our community.

I would open a gift shop and display beautiful Judaica and handmade crafts for sale to the public.

I would support a Kosher butcher so we could have a locally raised source of meat for sale out of our commercial kitchen. Perhaps we could learn how to make New York Style Pastrami?

Laurie will remain eternally youthful and energetic. I would freeze time so we could keep her forever.

Finally, I would have abundance for the membership so we can all attend seminars, conferences and other avenues of growth. We will learn together.

Gershon Baskin


Sun., Nov. 9, 2-4 pm, University Center Theater, 3rd floor of the University Center at the University of Montana
